After he'd driven Dipti's Father, Praful, to work, the family chauffeur Babu would drive back to the apartment outside of Bombay to ferry Dipti to preschool. Tall, with curly hair, a moustache and a kind face, Babu would kneel down to tie her shoes, then usher her to school. Afterward, she'd run down the steps with her classmates and Babu would be there waiting, in front of their robin-egg blue Ambassador sedan.

Young Dipti had a habit of falling asleep in moving vehicles. "On the weekends, we'd drive into the big city to see my grandparents, and it was a long drive. I'd fall asleep in the backseat, and when we got home my Dad would pick me up and carry me in." When she began grade school, across town at the prestigious JK academy, the bus ride was long. "I'd sit with the teacher on the way back, and fall asleep on her lap."

Dreamy and carefree, Dipti lived in the bubble of Mulund, a suburb of Bombay, in a large apartment, the 2nd floor of a complex filled with families from her Dad's work, supplying electricity to the city. It was a company complex filled with families, and Dipti remembers running around with the other kids, playing hide-and-go-seek or lagori, where one team tries to build a stack of stones while the other tries to knock it down.

Her school was based on the British system, with mandatory uniforms and different houses: Blue, White, Orange, Green. Dipti wore a white, short-sleeved shirt under a brown dress each day, and relished the field days where her Blue house would compete against the others.

Reserved by nature, her schools in Mulund and later Bombay saw the birth of the two Diptis: one, a keen observer, more likely to listen than talk, formed by years as the easy little sister who neither demanded nor sought out attention. Destined for a career as a therapist, Dipti earned multiple masters degrees and has practiced for years, focusing first on kids and now on UW physicians and residents.

The other Dipti? She's a low-key competitor, in everything from table tennis to field days to grade point average, a quiet assassin.

That duality, between the Two Diptis, isn't the only one. From almost the very beginning she's straddled the worlds of East and West, speaking Marathi at home with her Hindu family, and attending Christian school during the day, carrying around the mandatory green

prayer book. "I know all of the prayers, and the words to the songs." Dipti sang in the choir to standards like "The Lord Is My Shepherd" and "Silent Night."

After school and her first Masters, Dipti had plans: to travel, maybe live a year in France. But life had other plans for her, and she moved across the world to Seattle in 1992. In 1995 she welcomed son Neeraj and in 1998 daughter Priyanka, who grew up in Mountlake Terrace.

In 2006 she discovered the table tennis community at the Carl Gipson Center, and it was just the right combination for the two Diptis: warm and friendly, but deadly serious about table tennis; a place to try to destroy your opponent and then ask what they're bringing to the potluck. Today, she plays three times a week: Mondays, Wednesday, and Saturdays, finding a necessary outlet, a place where -- just like at school-- she can break out of her uniform, shed the weight of expectations, and lose herself in the game.

That same game brought her to Chuck, a longtime player, at open table tennis hours in Shoreline. Soon the two started playing racquetball and then table tennis at the Gipson Center. Chuck made space for all that Dipti was and all she was becoming. "I felt energized after I talked to him."

Today Dipti serves on the Center's Senior Advisory Committee and as our volunteer Table Tennis Coordinator. She sees what the Center has done for her community, and for so many others.

"It's a really good hub for people to do something they really enjoy. They've built relationships here."

I hope everyone is enjoying the fresh colors on the exterior of the Carl Gipson Center.

My name is Ieva Ohaks, and through my business, Ideal Color Consulting, I helped create this new color scheme. I guide homeowners, businesses, and organizations in selecting colors for their spaces, both interior and exterior, in paint and other finishes. There are many ways to approach color selection. For homeowners, the process is personal. I sit with the clients, asking questions about how the space is used, what tangible and intangible qualities they want, what they love, and what they would like to change.

For a community building like the Carl Gipson Center, the process involves a larger group of stakeholders, more complex functional requirements, and more detailed communication. For this project, we started with looking at the building and its surroundings, and evaluating the existing finishes and color placements. We discussed how the building could best be distinctive and welcoming in the neighborhood.

I created several distinct color palettes (darker, lighter, muted, bright, cool and warm colors), any of which would suit the building and harmonize within the neighborhood, which evoke different "feelings." We reviewed renderings of these ideas with a focus group, and a dark-blue with medium-green "Sea Glass" palette was the favorite. Next, I refined some variations within this concept. We worked with swatches on-site at the Center, choosing the best combination in the real-life conditions around the building.

The collaborative process that the Center's leadership put together has been a stellar example for any community project. This has been a great experience, with and for a great group of people, worthy of community pride.
