

GIPSON SPOTLIGHT

> Member JIM HAGGLUND





Jim Hagglund's 1974 Lake Stevens High School yearbook includes this note, written diagonally in red ink:

"Jim – Life isn't always the way we would like it to be, but that's what makes it so interesting. You have all the potential in the world Jim, but you must remember to allow for the human element."

Jim was the oldest of three boys, and his Dad was a proud Captain for Washington State Ferries. Jim remembers long road trips with his family. "My Dad had bought a used, white Datsun pickup. We three boys were in back under the canopy. There was a mattress in the back and we just laid on it. We read, colored, fought. When there's three boys, there's two on one all the time."

The family moved to Langley so Jim's Dad could sleep at home when his ferry was tied up for the night. On the island, Jim began seeing a darker side of the human element. "I often felt like I was going to throw up when I went to seventh grade at Langley Junior High."

He remembers being an outsider, being bullied, a kid throwing him up against the chalkboard. He tried sports like football, and threw discus in track,, but "... I had a heart condition that hadn't been diagnosed. Exercise brought on a racing

pulse, shortness of breath, sharp pains in my neck." Later, doctors would diagnose Jim with Wolfe Parkinson White Syndrome, but back then it was one more thing that made him different.

When his parents' marriage broke apart, Jim's dad moved with the three boys back to Lake Stevens. Before the end of his junior year, Jim was elected president of the student body, and ASB sent Jim to a week-long leadership camp.

Jim had found something at Lake Stevens High: belonging and affirmation. He found people who cared about him and his future. His guidance counselor, Mr. Tutlis, knew Jim had the aptitude and drive for college, but no money. So, he encouraged Jim to apply for a four-year Army ROTC scholarship. That fall, he started his first of four years at Gonzaga University on the Army ROTC scholarship he received. "I am forever grateful to the

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taxpayers of the United States for paying my way through college."

Jim's ROTC commitment included Army service, and he reported for Officer Basic Course at Fort Benjamin Harrison in Indianapolis in the summer of 1979. In September he was deployed to Panama. "Three weeks after I got there was the treaty transition. I just remember being locked in the barracks for four days with armored personnel ready in case there were riots that broke out or an attack on the military." Originally sent for two years, Jim extended twice, serving in Panama for a total of three years, three months, and three days.

While on leave, Jim became better acquainted with Lauri McDougall, who he'd met back in elementary school. After Jim returned to Fort Harrison, they'd exchange letters and cards. With a broadening smile he remembers: "I'd stay up until after 11pm, because it was cheaper to call her then." After Lauri returned from studying at Oxford, Jim proposed on July 29th, 1983, at the Eagle's Nest, a rotating restaurant in downtown Indianapolis. They'd marry on November 11th, at Lauri's parent's home in Everett, and welcome son Paul in 1988.

In the Army and in his career, one thing was constant: Jim loved technology. He loved to understand how new technology worked – loved how it made processes and people more efficient – and loved digging in to complex problems, and teaching others how things worked. He served for 37 years in business operations for Safeco and Liberty Mutual Insurance, managing countless software and hardware integrations and transitions, until retiring in April 2021.

In retirement, after his honey-do list ran out, he found himself asking "What are you going to do



where you have a purpose in life? That matches what your love of work was?" While touring the Gipson Center in September 2022, Jim saw a need for help at the Membership Desk. When our previous smartphone trainer left, he stepped in to offer Tech Help twice a month. Jim also assisted with last year's AV upgrade in Cascade View; helped another church partner learn our AV system; drives our mini-bus for trips; serves on our Senior Advisory Committee; and has coled the integration of new membership software with our Operations Director, Gul Subaykan.

We marvel at his infinite patience and ability to communicate. Jim gently explains how to text on a smartphone, over and over again. He listens intently to those who stop by the desk, eager to bend his ear about their bridge game or health problems. On Gipson Center trips to restaurants, museums or the outdoors, he makes his way to the slowest senior to walk alongside them.

The late Mrs. O'Rourke (1931-2008) would have been proud of Jim, not just for the number of things he does for others, but for how he does them. He doesn't just allow for the human element; he's built a life of service around it.


#### **Come Celebrate Cora!**
