Member PATRICA COOK







"Almost a week after Don passed away, my friend Lorraine said, 'You're coming to church with me.' Then in March, she said 'I want you to come as my guest to the Carl Gipson Center."

"I was sitting at home thinking, 'What am I going to do?' But coming here, I felt like I was coming back home."

PATRICIA COOK has been looking for "home" for a very long time.

Born in Nicholson, Pennsylvania, about 20 miles north of Scranton, she was raised in Factoryville, the first child of Earl and Gladys Williams. Her father was a professional chef, a rolling stone, and at 10 months old Patricia moved with her parents to Miami so he could cook in a high-class restaurant. She was a "daddy's girl," and walked on the beach and played in the sand, until Earl moved them again: this time back to Factoryville, then up near a restaurant in Hillburn, New York, in the Catskills Mountains.

By then, her brother John Michael had arrived and the years started bringing new siblings –

Diane Marie, Karen Jane, Donald Gary – and new towns, like Old Forge, New York, in the Adirondacks. "We loved that place: skiing, sleigh riding, playing at the beach." But cracks were forming, chasms between what Earl wanted and what Gladys needed. "The day after Karen was born, we were evicted from our house." Gladys and the kids moved back to the family farm in Pennsylvania, and Earl left when Patricia was eight.

"As a teen I was very independent. Kind of angry. Anything I wanted to do, I'd do it. I wanted to go to majorette lessons, but my Mom couldn't drive me. So, we painted an old bicycle and I rode five miles into town for those lessons." Patricia hated Lackawanna Trail High School - "I was bored, not challenged at all" – and a couple years after graduating connected with an Air Force recruiter in Scranton. Within six weeks, she'd started Basic Training at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas, then was transferred to Maxwell Air Force Base in Montgomery, Alabama. "They put this Yankee girl in the heart of Dixie, four years after the Civil Rights movement."

Patricia thought she'd pursue a military career, and hadn't planned on meeting Dwight Goggans. "At the end my first year, within one week I got promoted to Airman 1st Class, I got orders to Thailand, and I got pregnant." Little Eric arrived on November 27th, 1970, followed by Jill on April 30th, 1973. Dwight was a career Air Force man, a fuel specialist, and his orders took them to South Carolina, Italy, Delaware, Puerto Rico, Okinawa, Alabama and Florida. Patricia found ways to help on base: as a kindergarten teacher, running the library, helping the school counselors.

Like her father, Patricia kept looking for something in the distance, some place to call home. She and Dwight separated after 22 years, and she made a decision: it was time for her to go back to college. At 49, after attending four different universities over the years, she graduated with a degree in Psychology. In 2000 she moved to Port Townsend, Washington, to be closer to Jill and her kids, and worked at Skookum, helping adults with disabilities as a Job Coach and Developer.

One night in 2004, she said to Jill, "Let's go have

a drink at The Surf," a bar on Taylor Street down on the waterfront.

Patricia saw a tall, handsome man at the bar drinking ice water and asked him to dance. "You're the shortest woman I've ever danced with." said Don Cook.

Don was a widower, a commercial fisherman, a boat builder, spending months at a time in Alaska. After years in Sitka, Patricia wanted to marry or pack her bags. Don wouldn't let her go. "I really don't know what love is, but I know I want to get married to you." They had some good years together, in Alaska and Florida, traveling in their 5th wheel, until Don passed on January 15th, 2022.

Patricia's found a home here at the Gipson Center. You can find her here four or five days a week, volunteering, creating art, playing table tennis, or supporting fellow veterans at the monthly Heroes' Café.

"If you feel lonely, or you want to meet friends or do something, it's great. There's so much to do here. It's like my second home."
