Member JUANITA COMEAU







"Mom and Dad had a huge garden every year: carrots and peas and other vegetables. But the corn on the cob, that was a big deal. We'd take a wagon and go around the neighborhood and sell fresh corn on the cob, 20 cents an ear. All the money we made went toward going to the Minnesota State Fair. When the Fair came around, we had a day, and the whole family would go."

Juanita Comeau, her nine siblings and two parents would check out the tractors, the animals and the rides. Once a year Juanita would get cotton candy.

The Comeau family had to be thrifty, and that DNA persists in modern day Juanita: she does not waste words or actions. She is precise and thoughtful, without pretense or spectacle. In a word, Juanita Comeau is Mid-Western.

The third in line of ten kids in a Catholic family, Juanita was born in Hoven, South Dakota, population just over 300. When she was three, her Father, Dean, and Mom, Beann, moved the family to Roseville, MN. "It was wonderful. We had a farm, and acreage all around us; it had a pond and hills. In the summertime my Mom

would give me breakfast and then she wouldn't see us until dinnertime. You'd play in neighborhood baseball games, ride your bike. When it snowed, we could sled and toboggan in the hills."

Juanita was younger than her older siblings, Becky and Gary, but spent much of her childhood looking after Vicki, Steve, Richard, Patty, Nancy, Susan or Jennifer. When she could get away, she "... preferred to be outdoors. I liked to climb trees, and I was in Girl Scouts. I babysat as much as I could so I could raise \$54.00 to send myself to Girl Scout Camp for a week each summer."

When Juanita was 16 the Comeau family moved to Milwaukee, so her Father could start "Edward's Pipe & Tobacco." When she wasn't studying at Pius XI Catholic School or taking care of her brothers and sisters, she helped her Dad in the store.

After college at University of Wisconsin-Stout, Juanita needed to spread her wings. She bought her boyfriend's blue 1972 Ford Galaxy in January of 1977, and headed to a job in Washington state, where she'd never been.

Here we can begin to see the thread that runs through Juanita's life: she takes care of people.

In Vocational Rehabilitation, she took care of disabled veterans and adults with developmental disabilities. In the Everett School District, she coordinated Vocational Education across the District, advocating for opportunities for all kids, especially those who didn't have parents with deep pockets.

In 2001, when her parents needed her, she moved back to Wisconsin to take care of them.

In higher education, she took care of students who needed extra help to get to college, and those from different ethnic and cultural backgrounds.

Along the way, she took care of her girls: Roberta, born 1985, and Marisa, born 1994. In June of 2021, after moving back to Everett, Juanita found herself in new territory. "For somebody who took care of multiple people, now it's just me and my two dogs." Lucy is the Sheltie, and Ricci is the Border Collie mix, and those two get at least two walks a day, plus regular visits to Loganberry Dog Park.

"I didn't really know how to go out and make friends." A Gipson Center presentation in her community reunited her with Gipson Center Operations Manager Gul Subaykan, whom Juanita has known since Gul was a kid.

Now Juanita is a regular at the Carl Gipson Center, and rarely misses Cora's 9:30am Forever Fit class, Monday through Thursday. "I never imagined that I'd be going to a senior center."

"I come for the friendships."

In the Fall of 2021, at the request of Snohomish County government, VOA agreed to serve refugees in a "Welcome Center" model on Fridays at the Carl Gipson Center.

Our Welcome Center provides food, a sense of community, and multiple services from multiple partners. These services include housing and utility assistance; access to education; medical and dental triage services; employment support; household goods & clothing donations; and now opportunities to learn English


